

# A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO

At the start of 2022, the Foundation for National Parks & Wildlife (FNPW) looked back at the previous few years with optimism, recognising the significant impact it had achieved despite the challenges it had faced through Covid and one of the worst ever environmental disasters in the Black Summer Bushfires. Unfortunately, the outbreak of the war in the Ukraine, surging global energy prices, and increasing interest rates and inflation created further uncertainty.

Despite these challenges, FNPW successfully restarted corporate volunteering and events in New South Wales, Victoria, Queensland, and South Australia. The organisation remained committed to its goal of conserving parks and saving species throughout Australia, and it was able to continue many important programs with the support of government, corporate partners, local communities, volunteer groups, and donors.

FNPW also progressed on three of the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals to measure the impact of its work in key areas of focus, including 'Life on Land' and 'Partnerships for the Goals'. The organisation directed investment towards critical conservation projects that protect native wildlife and habitat, preserve cultural heritage, and support acute response initiatives. FNPW's fundraising efforts were boosted by a successful matched giving day in June, which raised over \$200,000, and by bequests from the estates of the late Thomas Patrick Neeson (Qld) and Dr. Alma Werner (SA), for which we are incredibly grateful.

FNPW continued its initiative to plant one million trees by 2025 in partnership with One Tree Planted and L'OCCITANE, supported by bushfire recovery nurseries established around the country. This project helps propagate native plants for erosion prevention and animal habitats, with seedlings established from indigenous tree species in each of the nursery locations and planted in national parks, as well as other public and private lands affected by bushfires. FNPW progressed 14 bushfire recovery nurseries,

which has enabled the organisation to grow more than 400,000 trees so far. Thanks to grant funding from the Australian Government, the NSW Government through its Environmental Trust, and individual and corporate donations, FNPW's Wildlife Heroes Emergency Response program has assisted more than 5000 wildlife volunteers nationwide, distributing over \$1,250,000 in funding to wildlife groups in need. This program supports crises response and provides volunteer wildlife rehabilitators and vets across the country with the resources, training, and funding needed to prepare for future wildlife emergencies.

FNPW also made progress on the \$10 million Remarkable Southern Flinders project, due for completion in 2024, in partnership with the SA Department of Environment and Water. The organisation has already seen 20 kilometres of new mountain bike trails open up in Mount Remarkable National Park at Willowie, with the new Epic Trail set to start construction soon. FNPW is continuing to support Indigenous ranger programs, including the Warddeken

Daluk (Women's) Ranger Program in the Northern Territory, which is focusing on the Mayh (animals) Recovery Project.

Looking ahead, FNPW remains committed to its goal of planting one million trees, supporting disaster relief response programs, and providing more resources to train Wildlife Friendly Vets.

The organisation is grateful to all those who have contributed to its mission, including the voluntary board, executive team, staff, and special thanks to retiring board member Susie Corlett for her contribution over the last 5 years.



## **FINANCIAL SUMMARY**

#### **DELIVERY** OF PURPOSE

In 2022, \$5,146,688 was committed to delivery of purpose. This represents an increase of \$1,298,507 on 2021.

### TOTAL **INCOME**

Total income for 2022 at \$5,437,319 was an increase of \$1,130,459 from 2021. Beguest revenue of \$511,967 was received from Late Thomas Patrick Neeson, QLD for \$361,966.50 and Estate of the Late Dr. Alma Werner, SA for \$150,000. Our sincere gratitude goes to them and their families for the amazing contribution these bequests made to safeguarding natural Australia for future generations.



#### **TOTAL EXPENSES**

Total expenditure in 2022 was up \$1,366,493 from the previous year. This increase in expenditure was driven by a \$1,298,507 increase in Delivery of Purpose funding, offset by a reduction in Fundraising.

#### **OPERATING SURPLUS**

The operating surplus for 2022 was \$(638,702).

- The delivery of purpose for 2022 was \$5,146,668 for the year.
- This represents 95% of income.
- FNPW Projects disbursements increased year on year by \$1,306,044 mainly driven by the progress of the Remarkables - Great Southern Flinders project.
- There were some continued delays in project delivery due to COVID19 restrictions. However, the funds for committed projects are carried forward in the balance sheet.
- Heritage Estates was completed in 2022 and the funds remaining have formed the new Establishment Fund. The strategy continues to create FNPW projects that are funded by government as opposed to government projects managed by FNPW.

- Total income for 2022 was \$5,437,319 an increase of \$1,130,459 from the previous year.
- Significant Increase in income was mainly due to delivery of
  - government funded projects \$1,397,182 specifically due to Remarkable Southern Flinders.
  - bequests increased by \$201,219.
- Decrease in income from general fundraising and corporate support activities due to the current subdued fundraising environment.
- Fundraising during 2022 continued to be focused on delivery against our core purpose; purchasing available lands on the edges of our national parks, supporting bushfire recovery regeneration projects, funding conservation grants to protect threatened species and supporting volunteer wildlife carers through crises.
- Two bequests were received during the year totaling \$511,967.

## **EVIDENCE THAT OUR PROJECTS MAKE** A DIFFERENCE

- Total Expenses at \$6,076,021 increased year on year by \$1,366,493. This increase was driven by several factors.
- Increase in Delivery of Purpose \$1,402,362 (DOP) include:
- \$1,306,044 increase in projects costs largely due to scale of the Remarkable Southern Flinders project.

\$79,366 decrease in project management costs due to better project recovery

\$175,684 increase in awareness raising costs mainly due to salary costs for new staff.

- Increase in Expenses \$70,603 (outside DOP) include:
  - Fundraising costs were \$57,610 lower than the previous year as more spend on advertising was in raising awareness of projects.
  - Wages and salaries are split across the various expense lines but for 2022 were \$1,010,108 compared to \$821,161 in 2021. An increase of \$188,947 due to:

Focus on building the revenue team with the addition of Chief Marketing & Revenue Officer, Head of Partnerships and Marketing Assistant.
